#### **Meet Your Neighbor**

Kim Baenisch, Trips for Kids Marin by Dotty LeMieux

I met Kim Baenisch, Executive
Director of Trips for Kids Marin
(TFKM), in her office in the
repurposed modest building on 4th
Street, San Rafael, which houses this
non-profit that brings the experience
of mountain biking and environmental

awareness to kids that otherwise might never be exposed to the natural world.

Founded in 1988 in San Rafael, TFKM brings inner city kids that are considered "at risk" to natural open spaces, and since it's inception, it's opened 50 active chapters across the U.S. and Canada. The program fosters self-esteem, team building, the art of cooperating with others, and teaches bike repair and maintenance skills. Kids can even "earn a bike" by participating in mechanical after-school workshops. Some kids later become volunteers in the program; others find jobs that grow out of the skills they gain in the workshops.

The program take kids on trail rides in Golden Gate Park, Point Pinole Regional Park and other local parks, teaching the youth to appreciate the environment, mindfulness and to work as a team on group rides.

Under Kim's leadership, the program's scope and reach has grown. She's added new fundraising campaigns, refined its bike shop and eBay store processes, and spearheaded new partnerships with the County of Marin Parks & Open Spaces and local service agencies. She's put a new energy behind teaching participants basic bicycle skills, safety, and trail etiquette.

In addition to serving Bay Area youth, TFKM provides a valuable service to our local community, by offering "gently used" bike clothing, gear, and bicycles at its Re-Cyclery Bike Shop. Professional bike mechanics (and volunteers) refurbish donated bikes for adults and kids at 610 4th Street. TFKM's "Earn a Bike" program operates in San Rafael's Canal community, and its Mobile Bike Workshops occur at six Marin schools where youth learn safe bike riding skills over 10-week after-school sessions.

The Re-Cyclery Bike Shop provides 50% of the revenue needed to fund its youth programs. The rest comes in the form of grants and individual donations (e.g. Marin Community Foundation), and special events like TFKM's 30th Anniversary Gala to be held in Mill Valley on Oct. 19, 2018.

Before TFKM, Kim served as the Executive Director for the Marin County Bicycle Coalition, leading the implementation of the Master Bicycle/Pedestrian Plan for every town/city in Marin County, opening the Cal Park Tunnel, and increasing the availability of bike lanes countywide. She is an enthusiastic road and mountain biker, and more recently has become a competitive crew rower with Marin Rowing Association in Larkspur. Her husband, Steven Plunkett, a hazardous materials engineer for Alameda County, commutes to the East Bay in multi-modal fashion using his car, e-bike and BART. They moved to Greenwood Avenue seven years ago, and love the quiet neighborhood, the mature trees, the friendly people, the easy commute and ability to walk downtown to shops and entertainment.

Kim emphasized that the Re-Cyclery Bike Shop "is a great resources for the whole community, especially families, who can buy low cost bikes and other gear, donate their outgrown bikes, and can volunteer – all of these efforts help us get more kids on bikes!" She invites everyone to visit their location to check out the goods on offer and see what great work the staff and kids are doing. For more info, visit

## Sidewalk Repair Program Update

Update from Talia Smith, City of San Rafael DPW

The City of San Rafael did the Sidewalk Lottery this May and sent out the following notification to all property owners that applied:

"The Sidewalk Repair Program application period closed on Friday, April 27th. The City received 366 applications for FY 2017-18. Funding for the program will be appropriated according to a priority ranking determined by a random lottery. Due to high demand, the City doubled the funding for this year's program and intends to accommodate at least 300 applicants, 150 more than previously planned. On May 2nd, Public Works Staff conducted the lottery and randomly assigned a priority ranking number to each application. The City will allocate funding for the program according to the priority ranking (1-366). If you have a low priority ranking based on the lottery, you may still be accepted into this year's program.

Again, we have doubled the funding for this year's program in hopes of accommodating all applicants into this year's program.

Public Works will be performing inspections for all applicants of the program. The inspection will detail what type of repair may be necessary. Repairs may vary between full replacement of the sidewalk or simple sidewalk shaving. The inspection will also determine whether curb or gutter or a tree is involved. Once the inspection is complete, you will receive a copy of the inspection which will detail the necessary sidewalk repair work. The inspection will also estimate the City cost-share and total cost to the property owner.

Inspections should be completed no later than early June. We request that you wait to ask any questions until after you receive your completed inspection. Please do not contact the contractors directly until you have received your completed inspection form from the City. Once inspections are complete, the City will be able to determine how many applicants can be supported by the program this year. Applicants will receive a final notification of whether they've been accepted into the program at that time. Thank you, and we appreciate your patience and cooperation in the first year of this new program."

We are excited that we were able to double the funding to kick-off the program. Fortunately, we believe there are several properties that will not require full removal and replacement, but only a sidewalk shaving. In those cases, the fix will be much cheaper and therefore our funding can go a lot further for the 366 applications. It is still my hope that we can support every property that applied!

Inspections began this week. We're getting through the addresses fairly quickly (~20-30 per day), so I'm hopeful that we'll be able to get completed inspection forms back to the property owners by June. After that, Van Midde and Coastside Concrete will coordinate with the property owners to do all repairs this summer.
